An Education Like No Other

Phillips Exeter Academy was founded in 1781 by Dr. John Phillips, a graduate of Harvard and resident of Exeter. Now in its third century, Phillips Exeter Academy affirms the intent of John Phillips to link goodness with knowledge, developing the consciences and training the minds of students so that they may usefully serve society.

A gift from philanthropist Edward S. Harkness in 1930 established a method of teaching unique to Exeter and central to its teaching philosophy. The Harkness plan calls for an oval table in each classroom, with a class of 12 students and ample opportunity for dialogue. The Harkness table places students at the center of the learning process and encourages them to learn from one another.

The academic life of the school depends upon the quality of each student's preparation for active participation in learning. As one of the school's legendary teachers said, "What happens in class depends upon what the students have done before the class begins."

The Academy has been coeducational since 1970, when women were first admitted as day students. Today, 51 percent of the students are young women.
